My first experience with soccer was in 1976. I was in ninth grade at Fort Sill, Oklahoma where my father was stationed with the U.S. Army. I was playing pick-up soccer with a small group of friends and a few soldiers who came from various foreign countries. I was amazed at their ability to control a ball with their feet, chest, thigh, and head; literally commanding the ball to do what they wanted! At that moment I was hooked! There was no organized soccer in that area in the 1970's, so playing High School soccer was not an option. My senior year of High School we moved to Carlisle Barracks, Pennsylvania. High School soccer was available, so I tried out... and was cut from the team. Rather than being disillusioned with the sport, I became determined to be better and spent practically every day after school practicing controlling the ball and shooting on goals by myself. Upon graduation I went to WVU and would play pick-up games quite frequently after classes and on weekends. These games frequently included former members of the Varsity team or, in the off-season, current members. It was through this experience I learned that playing was the best teacher if you had the heart and determination to learn and improve without getting too discouraged. Finally, my second year of college a Varsity player told me I should try out for the Varsity team, they felt I was better than some current players. So, I did, and made the team. That was my first experience playing an 11 aside organized game and I ran around like a chicken with no head. So, I had to learn how to play positionally. I quickly figured out that I was basically a glorified practice player for the Varsity squad. I got to warm up with the team and sit the bench during games. Initially I was not a part of the travel squad, but eventually I was called up to that position, which meant I had a chance to be put into a game if there was an injury or the score was high enough. I finally made my debut in a game we were winning 5-0 with 12 minutes remaining. I did this for two years and enjoyed every minute pushing myself and the varsity players I practiced against to be better.

My Senior year, college courses were becoming more demanding, and I had to student teach. So, I left the team.

I was hired by Trinity High School in October, 1987. In 1988 I became the Junior Varsity coach under head coach and 2014 WSHOF inductee Ed Batista. In 1990 Ed left to coach at the collegiate level, and I became the Varsity coach. From 1990-1994 the Trinity Boys soccer team won their Mid-Penn Division Championship 5 years in a row with a record of 62 wins, 0 losses in Divisional play. We attained Mid-Penn Division Championships again in 1997, 1999, 2000. In 2004 the Trinity Boys finished third in Districts, and in 2005 Trinity finished as District Champions. In 2006 we finished 2nd place in the District Championship. Between 1990 and 2014 the Trinity Boys soccer teams Divisional record was 221 wins, 57 losses, and 12 ties. My overall record as Trinity's head coach was 340 wins, 161 losses, and 19 ties, making Districts 23 times out of 25, and advancing to the State playoffs 5 times. After retiring from coaching following the 2014 season, I was honored in 2015 to be inducted into the inaugural Trinity Hall of Fame, and to receive the A.I. Garner Outstanding Coach Award.

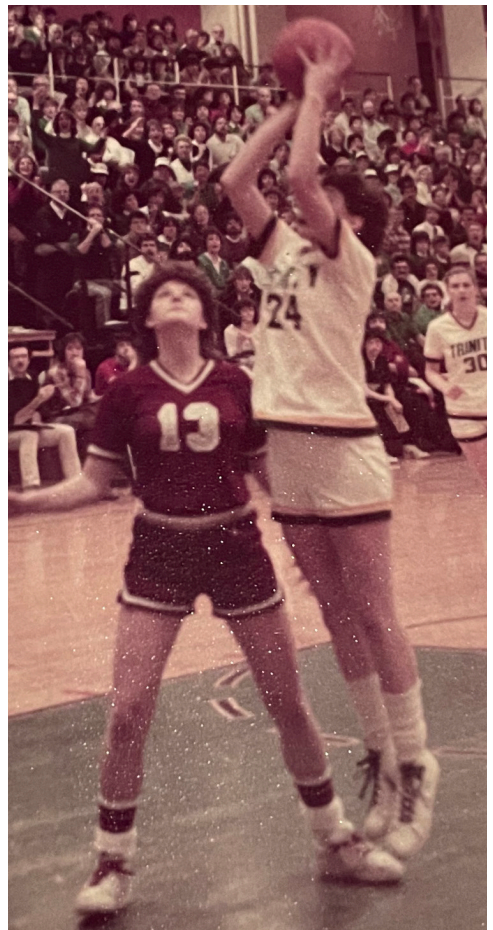

Gail Beatty Davis is a 1986 graduate of Trinity High School. While at Trinity, Gail was a member of the first girls' basketball state championship team under Coach Harry DeFrank. Gail was best known for her defense, as she always defended the best player on the opposing team. Gail was a three year starter in basketball and was named All Conference and All State honorable mention her senior season. Gail's best basketball performance came in the District Championship game vs. York Catholic in which she garnered 28 points. Coach DeFrank's favorite line was, "If Gail is tired, we are all tired" and this determined whether or not he would call a timeout. Gail was always in the best shape due to her commitment to cross country for the fall seasons. Gail was part of conference championships in several of her years on the cross country team at Trinity. Gail was a top runner all four of her years. Gail also was a member of a highly successful track team at Trinity, under the direction of Jim Hudson, Gail ran the 800, 400, the mile relay, and two mile relay. Gail also began to throw the javelin her senior year to gain points in the field. Gail was part of a mile relay team that placed at both districts and states.

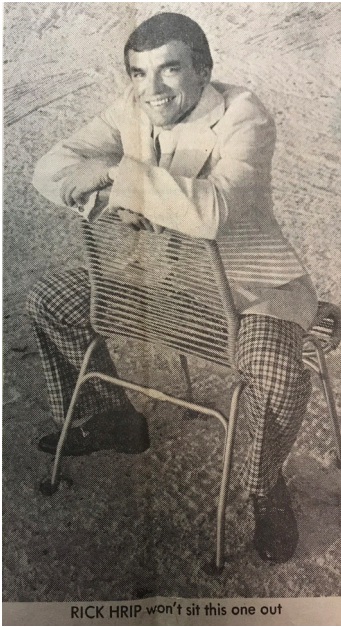
Gail was honored with a full scholarship for basketball to play at La Salle University in Philadelphia after her time at Trinity where she was captain of the team her senior season. During her four years at La Salle, the team won the league title twice and appeared in the NCAA tournament eventually losing to National Champion, Tennessee.

Gail remained in Philadelphia as a graduate assistant coach with the women's basketball team at La Salle where she pursued her masters degree in education. While coaching at La Salle, Gail was lured away by the opportunity to coach full time at the United States Naval Academy in Annapolis, Maryland. Gail coached there for 2 seasons where she recruited nationally, monitored the student's academic performance, and focused on coaching the post players. Gail was once again lured to a higher level of competition and moved to Georgetown to coach the women's basketball team there. While at Georgetown, her responsibilities continued to grow as she assisted in every part of the operation of the program. Gail remained at Georgetown for 5 seasons until the birth of her first son.

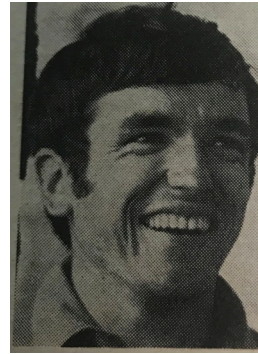
Since leaving the college scene, Gail has coached her sons' school teams, her sons' AAU travel teams, and two different stints as a high school coach both in New York and in Maryland. Gail is married to Emmett Davis, the associate head coach of the Naval Academy men's basketball team. Emmett has previously been the head coach of Colgate University, where the family resided for 13 years before moving to Tulsa,

Oklahoma where Emmett was an assistant coach. Gail and Emmett met when they were both coaching Navy basketball teams, Emmett with the men, and Gail with the women. The family returned to Annapolis in 2012 where Emmett once again joined the Navy staff. The couple has three sons. Emmett, who played football at Navy, Shane who played football at Lafayette, and Brendan who is a basketball player at UMBC in Baltimore, Maryland.

Tourney With Purpose, Meaning, Heart

They're getting ready for the Gittlen, the golf tournament that's more than a sports and social event. It's the tourney with a purpose, with meaning, with a heart.

Before they even tee it up for the 1983 Gittlen, a record \$55,000 will be added to the fight against cancer.

In 14 years, tournament sponsors have contributed more than \$330,000 to the Jake Gittlen Cancer Research Lab of the Milton Hershey Medical Center.

Warren Gittlen directs the tournament he founded in memory of his father, a long-time golfing enthusiast who died of cancer.

The Gittlen has special meaning in a sports sense, too.

"When it comes down to the premier golf event in Central Pennsylvania, it has to be the Gittlen," says Ronnie Leo, who plays in most of the area tournaments. "It's the one tournament that everybody enters. If you want to be the best golfer

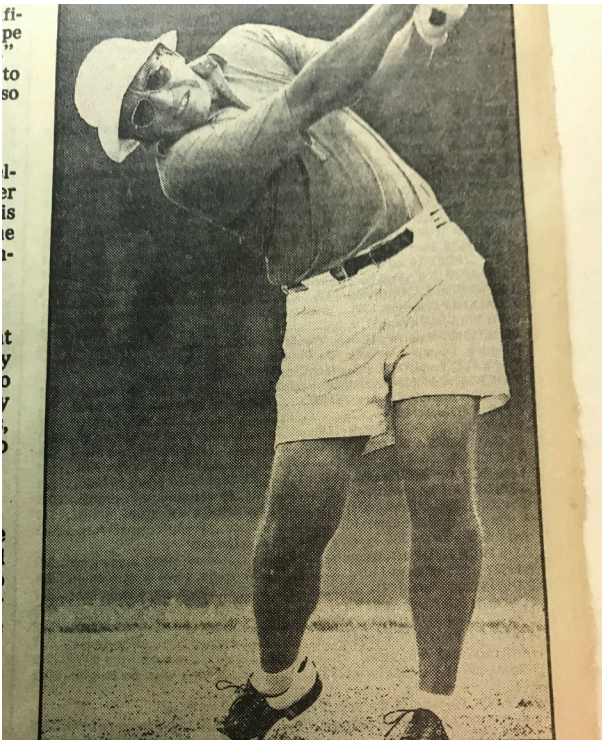
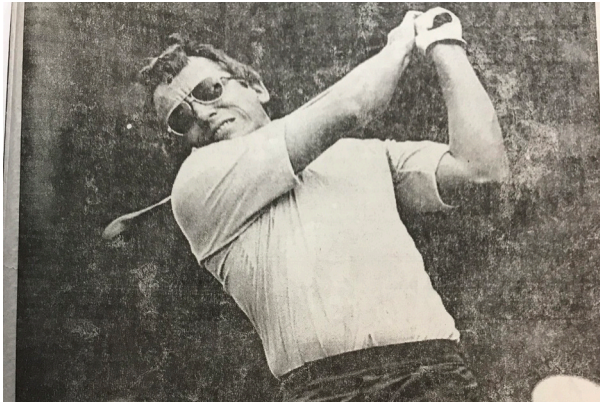
Dr. Andy Panko of the host Blue Ridge Country Club is the defending champ. He tied the tournament record last year with his even par total of 144 for 36 holes. York's Sherm Keeney won with the same total in 1972.

Panko fired a two-under-par 70 in the final round to finish one stroke ahead of Jim Dolan of Carlisle and two shots in front of John Trach of Harrisburg. Scott Christie was the medalist and former champ George Easley was the first round leader.

Carlisle's Rick Hrip, the 1981 champion, did not play last year because of a business commitment. He is entered this year.

"Hrip is going to be the MC at our banquet Thursday night," says Warren. "He's a serious about the job that he asked me to take him to the Medical Center so he can see the work that is being done there."

When the word came through that Rick Hrip had shot a course record seven-under-par 63 at Highland, there were two reactions.

"A 63? No, that couldn't be right. They must mean 73," said those who know Highland for what it is, a tight course that is deceptively difficult.

"Hey, Hrip ripped Highland!" said somebody, making the first of many bad jokes.

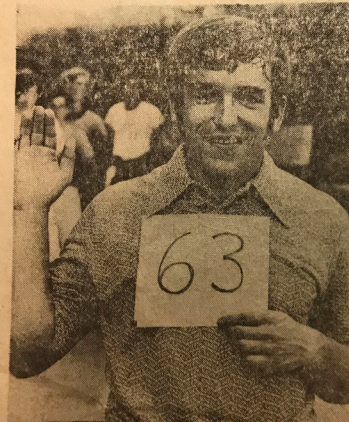
But the word that had preceded Hrip's ride from Highland to Shannopin after the 36-hole local qualifier for the National Open yesterday was correct.

Hrip indeed had set a course record, chomping a stroke off the old mark held by four men. His score probably was the lowest turned in by any of the 4,159 golfers in the 88 local qualifiers across the country.

Hrip needed the record round to beat out Jim Masserio for the medal. Hrip shot 73-63-136 to Masserio's 67-70-137, thus reversing the order of finish of last year's top two qualifiers.

"I hit everything good for a complete round," said Hrip, a 25-year-old traffic engineer for United Telephone.

Hrip birdied the first hole with a 10-foot

putt, then he over in six under-par 15 feet or larger 62, his eagle putt.

Hrip plus a semi-private won the individual Indiana State Open 1988 and last year's Penn Open.

Rick Hrip was born and raised in Butler, PA. He was fortunate to begin playing golf at the age of 12. His step-father worked at Armco Steel Corporation which purchased a golf course near Slippery Rock, PA for its employees/families. He achieved early success at Armco Country Club by winning his first of six consecutive club championships at the age of 15.

Hrip was a 1964 graduate of Butler Area Senior High School where he played on the golf team for three years. During that time, Butler won the 1962 Western Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic League (WPIAL) team championship. He also won the 1964 WPIAL individual championship at the famed Oakmont Country Club. Hrip played in two PIAA individual championships and tied for eighth in 1964. He was inducted into the Butler County Sports Hall of Fame in 1977.

Hrip continued his golf career at Indiana University of Pennsylvania (IUP) and earned a bachelors degree in natural sciences with an area of concentration in mathematics. During his IUP golf career, the university won the 1968 National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) team championship in Bemidji, MN, and Hrip won the 1968 NAIA individual championship. He was also named to the 1968 NAIA First Team Golf All-America. During Hrip's four years at IUP, he played in six national golf championships (4 NAIA and 2 NCAA) and was selected to play in the 1968 NCAA East/West golf match in Las Cruces, NM. He was inducted into the IUP Athletic Hall of Fame in 1997.

After college, Hrip began working as a management trainee for United Telephone in Butler which later became the Sprint Corporation. His business career was interrupted in 1968 when he was drafted into the U.S. Army. Hrip is a veteran of the Vietnam War and held the rank of sergeant. He was awarded three army commendation medals, including two with valor.

After his tour in Vietnam, Hrip returned to his work in Butler with United Telephone in 1970. In 1972, he was transferred to United Telephone's eastern headquarters in Carlisle, PA. Hrip was very active in tournament golf at all levels and fund-raising for cancer research.

Hrip has won 7 Harrisburg District Individual tournaments, 4 Jake Gittlen Memorial tournaments, 28 best-ball championships, 12 Pennsylvania State VFW championships, 4

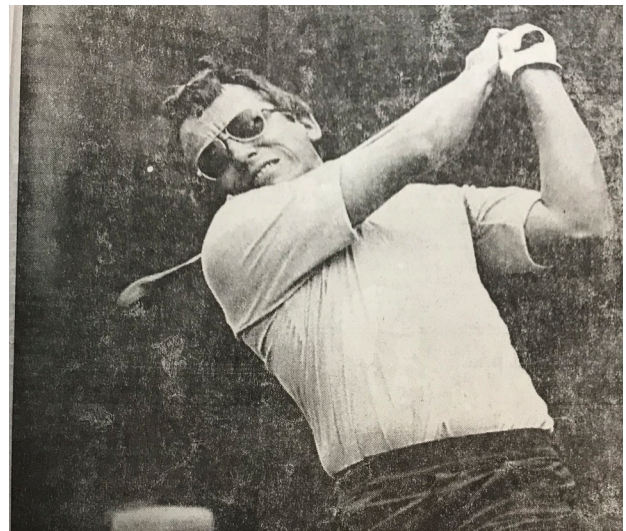
Butler County Opens, 7 Carlisle Country Club championships and 2 Carlisle Country Club senior club championships.

Hrip started the Harrisburg District Junior Golf League in 1977. He has served as President of the Harrisburg District Golf Association and was named their "Person of the Year" in 1985. Also, Hrip has served on the executive committee of the Pennsylvania Golf Association for six years. Currently, he volunteers as a rules official for the Pennsylvania Golf Association and the Golf Association of Philadelphia.

Hrip was credited with raising over one million dollars during a 28 year period for cancer research. This was accomplished via the Jake Gittlen Memorial Golf Tournament on behalf of the Penn State Hershey Cancer Institute.

Hrip transferred to Sprint's headquarters in Overland Park, KS in December 1997 and was transferred back to Carlisle, PA in December 2000. Hrip's office was later moved to Harrisburg. He retired in 2009 after a 40 year telecommunications career from EMBARQ (former local division of Sprint) as Vice President-External Affairs. He was responsible for legislative, regulatory, and public affairs in Pennsylvania and New Jersey.

Rick and his wife, Sue, who is the "love and rock of his life" have been married for 42 years on May 17. They reside in Mechanicsburg and have two terrific sons, Andrew and Max.

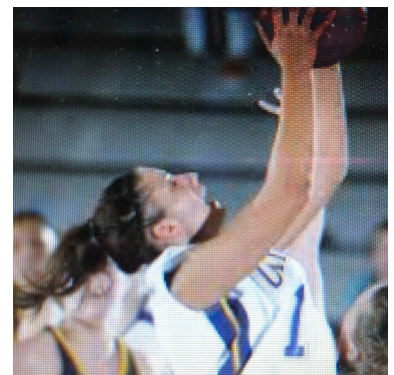
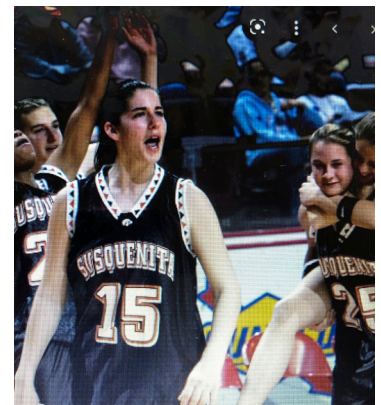
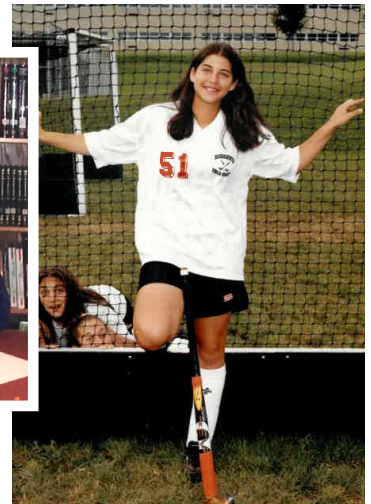

Sherri, born Sherrilyn Michelle Mikus in November of 1985, knew very early on that sports would be an important part of her life. The entire family, which included her mother, Jo Anne, her father, Andy, and two older brothers, Joey and Andrew, would all be playing every sport you could think of in their backyard in Duncannon, Pennsylvania.

Sherri's first organized sport was softball, followed by basketball, and was even the first girl in her town to suit up for football! She ended up winning defensive player of the year but ultimately ended up switching to field hockey to round out her three-sport career heading into her freshman year at Susquenita High School.

Mikus was a four-year Blackhawk starter in field hockey, basketball, and softball. In field hockey she racked up 77 points with 27 goals, basketball she finished with 1,493 career points, and in softball she batted 128 hits, 104 runs, a .440 BA, and 16 home runs.

Her senior year the field hockey team advanced to the state semi-finals, her basketball team won the District 3 championship where she led her team in every statistical category, and the softball team won yet another division championship. Mikus was a division one prospect in all three sports that she played but ultimately chose the hardcourt and signed with The University at Albany, a D-1 program competing in the American East Conference.

Mikus was a four-year letter winner, won the Women's Basketball MVP Award her Sophomore year, and finished her career ranked 15th in assists for the school's program.

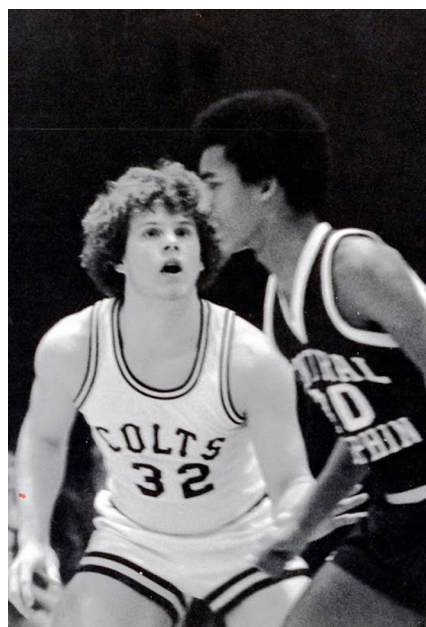
After her college career, Mikus went on to play basketball professionally in Europe. She signed with Slammers Sports Agency which landed her in Switzerland; for her second professional season, she signed with Chris Coates Sports Agency and was signed to a team in Romania. Mikus played in the top league in Romania where she played against WNBA stars Shay Doron and Tina Thompson and led her team to a playoff birth.

Even when Sherri settled into the fitness industry after her professional career, she still kept basketball a big part of her life. She hosted her own Basketball Camps in the Albany, New York area for middle and high school girls for the next several years. Mikus was passionate about mentoring the youth and providing them knowledge on what to expect for the next phase of their athletic journey and aptly named her camp "Next Level Training Camp."

Sherri is still playing basketball in and around New York City in numerous leagues and even played in the Women's American Basketball Association (WABA) for the 2017-2018 season with the Mount Vernon Shamrocks.

Currently, Sherri lives in Brooklyn, NY, and is a Senior Manager for Apple at their Global Flagship store on 5th avenue in New York City.





Gib Parthemore

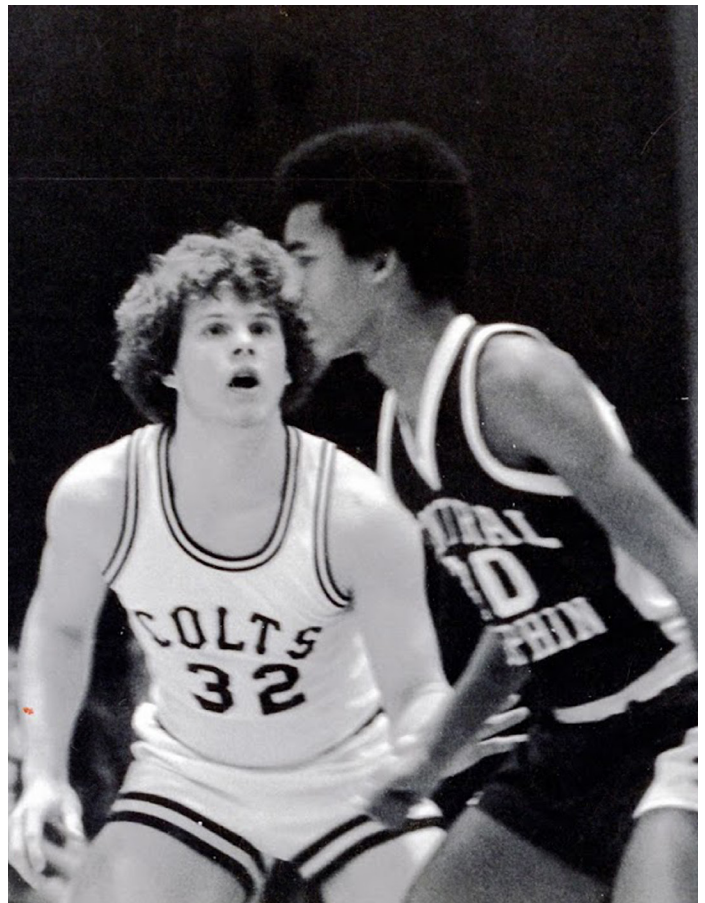
Gib's love for sports began at an early age and was encouraged and nurtured by his parents, Gil and Sondra. He began playing baseball and football with the New Cumberland youth programs and continued in baseball with New Cumberland Twilight into his 30's.

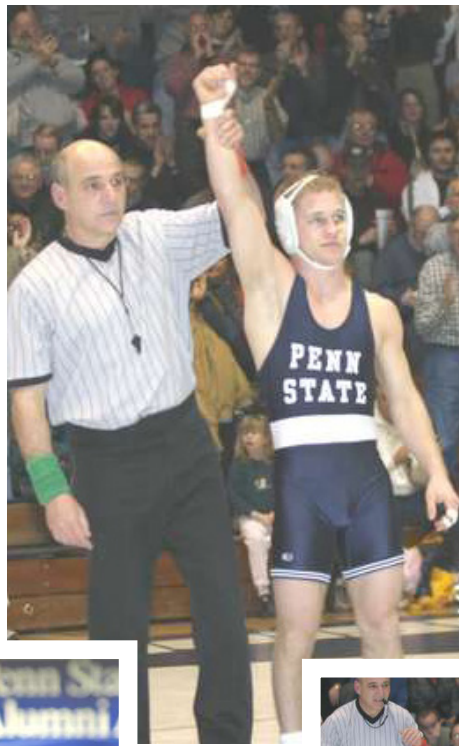
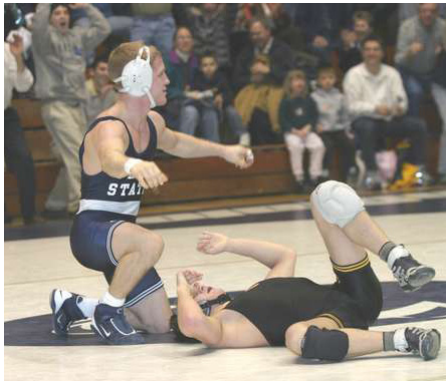
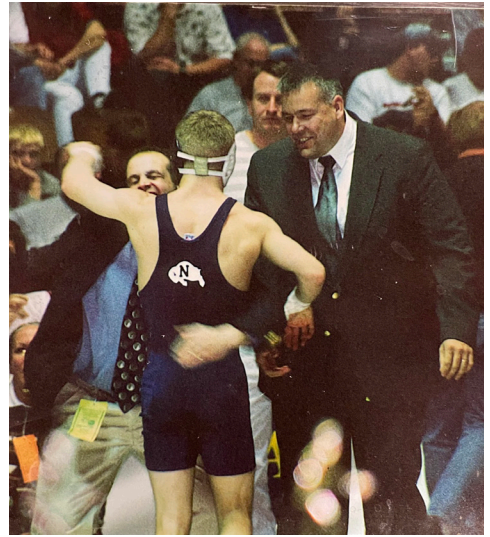
He began playing basketball in 7th grade when he was taking his sign-up slip to the office for wrestling when Don Fortna, the New Cumberland Junior High basketball coach stopped him. Coach Fortna talked with him for a couple of minutes and convinced him he was now signing up for basketball, not wrestling.

At Cedar Cliff High School Gib was fortunate enough to be coached by Bob Craig, Bob Pavlovich and Bob Repetz. He played football, baseball and basketball for his entire high school career, but realized early on that his first love was baseball. During his senior year, the football team earned South Central League Co-Champion honors and the baseball team won the league outright. He was named to the "Big 33" Football Classic and earned All-League and All-State honors in football along with Honorable Mention All American by Scholastic Coach Magazine. He was recruited to play football at the collegiate level, but not baseball. He accepted a football scholarship at West Virginia University with the understanding that he would have the opportunity to play baseball as well as football after a year or two of concentrating on football.

Gib lettered in his two years of football, but when his junior year arrived, Don Nehlen was hired to replace Frank Cignetti as head coach. Coach Nehlen told him that he couldn't play baseball in the Spring so he decided to leave football and walk on to the baseball team. He made the team, caught every other game of the double headers in the Spring NCAA regular season and went on to letter all three years he played. In 1982, under the tutelage of Head Coach Dale Ramsburg, WVU baseball finished second in the Southeast Regional of the College World Series in Columbia, SC and finished in the AP Top 20. During the 1982 campaign he was named Atlantic 10 Player of the Week and in 1983, he led the team in game winning and go-ahead RBI.

Gib is a licensed funeral director and an active community member serving in various capacities in several service clubs, foundations and as a past school director for the West Shore School District. He and his wife Joanna live in New Cumberland where they raised their two sons, Gibby and Chris, who excelled in athletics in their own right at the high school and NCAA levels respectively.





Adam Smith

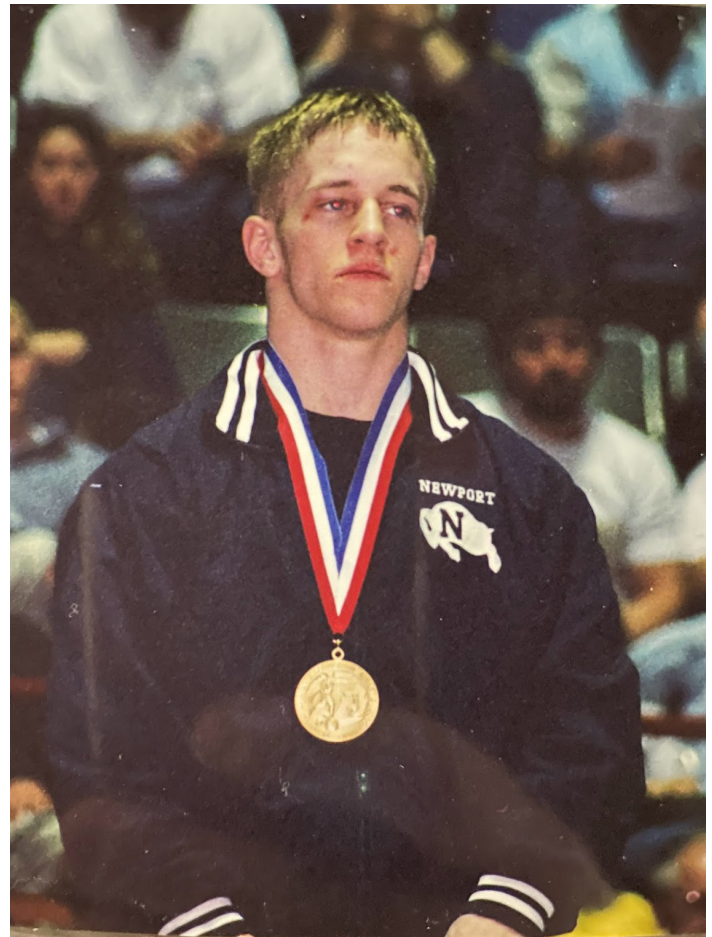
Adam Smith is a 2001 graduate of Newport High School, a 2005 graduate of Penn State University (B.S. Business Management) and a 2017 graduate of the University of Villanova (Executive MBA). Smith, who was raised on a dairy farm in Perry County, is the youngest of Hunter and Kathy Smith's three children and credits a lot of his work ethic to his early days on the farm. He is very thankful for the network of people who have supported him over the years including his family, community and a great group of friends and mentors.

At Newport, Smith was a 4-year starter for the Buffaloes, a 4x Sectional Champion, District Champion and a 3x PIAA State Medalist (3rd and 5th in 1999 and 2000, respectively). In 2001, he was the PIAA AA State Champion at 119 lbs. At the time, Smith was the winningest wrestler in Perry County and still holds the record for the most wins at Newport High School. In his senior year, Smith was chosen to compete in the Dapper Dan Wrestling Classic for Team Pennsylvania. Outside of wrestling, Smith pole vaulted for two years and was named the Defensive Player of the Year for the football team in 1999. He was also a member of the National Honor Society and the Student Council.

Upon graduation from Newport, Smith attended Penn State University and was a 4-year starter, 3x NCAA National Qualifier and a co-captain of the team during his senior year. He was a freestyle All-American, placing 3rd at University Nationals, and he was the runner-up for the University World Team Trials in 2005. He was twice named Big-Ten Wrestler of the Week and was an Academic All-American. After graduating from Penn State, he spent a year working in Harrisburg for Care Capital Management and running a wrestling club, until he returned to the mat where he spent the next three years training for a spot on the 2008 Olympic Team. During his international career, he finished 3rd, 5th and 7th at the US Open in Freestyle at 55kg (2006, 2007 and 2008, respectively) and competed in the final Olympic Trials in 2008. He wrestled for the New York Athletic Club (NYAC) as well as the Nittany Lion Wrestling Club (NLWC). During those years, he spent time on staff for the Penn State Wrestling Team as the Director of Operations and was also a club coach for the NLWC.

Since graduating from Penn State, he has coached thousands of kids through outreach camps, clinics and clubs, and he has privately coached numerous High School State Champions and State Medalists. He takes a lot of pride in the kids he has had the privilege of coaching as well as the people to whom he has introduced to the sport. One of his goals is to show up with his family, his community, and his career the same way...to have fun, work hard and keep making progress. He plans to attend Shippensburg University, continue his basketball career at the NCAA Division II level and plans to major in finance. Trey has volunteered in the community with the Salvation Army and gives back to the local youth basketball programs as a mentor. A four-year letterwinner and three-year captain for the Bubblers basketball team, Trey is a two-time All-State selection and is fourth overall in career points with 1,624 and first in point-per-game average.

"Outside of school and sports, I enjoy going on hikes and spending time with my adopted Rottweiler, Lexi. Adopting a dog has really taught me what unconditional love is and introduced me to a new level of responsibility. Another activity that I enjoy is playing chess. I started playing two years ago out of boredom during quarantine, but it has developed into something I truly relish. my athletic and academic careers. Between the online learning and the zoom football meetings, to not being able to have any fans outside of our parents, it has made it hard to continue to play hard and progress."

Red Land

Zayda Crumpton: Zayda is a two-year member of the National Honor Society and Spanish National Honors Society with a 95-grade point average. She is going to Kent State University to study nursing and play NCAA Division I lacrosse for the Golden Flashes. Zayda served in leadership roles for two years as part of Mini-THON, was on Student Council and served as a church counselor prior to the pandemic. She is a three-sport athlete for the Patriots playing soccer, basketball, and lacrosse with 11 varsity letters and several all-star recognitions.

"I was recruited to play at the NCAA Division I level by Kent State University in Ohio. This is by far one of my biggest accomplishments in my sports career. When I found out about another accomplishment, being the preseason MVP for my division, I was very happy and couldn't wait to tell my family. I talked to my dad about how I would need to take this title and not be satisfied with it but instead prove that I deserve it. I am excited for what this season holds for me and my team as I play alongside my little sister and some of my best friends."

Kaden Peifer: Kaden is a National Honor Society member and has a 3.8-grade point average. He plans to attend Delaware University, study business, and play NCAA Division I baseball. A member of the Red Land Little League World Series U.S. Champions team, Kaden works with Patriots Helping Patriots and is the Friendship Club President. A two-sport athlete for the Patriots, Kaden has six varsity letters in baseball and football while also being part of the unified bocce squad the last two years. The Patriots baseball team has appeared in back-to-back PIAA Championship games, winning it all in 2019.

"I received an offer from the University of Delaware to continue my education and play baseball as a pitcher. My dream came true with this offer. Without the feeling of embarrassment and failure as a pitcher in the Little League World Series World Championship game against Japan in 2015, I would not be anywhere near the pitcher I am today. This uncomfortable situation drove me to work hard. I know I have come so far, but there is still a lot more work that must be done to be the best version of myself."

Susquenita

Lillian Feltenberger: Lillian has been a distinguished honor roll student all four years with 98-grade point average. She plans to attend Rider University where she received the Presidential Scholarship, plans to study health science with a medical school focus and play NCAA Division I softball. A four-year part of Mini-THON, Lillian also took part in Walk-A-Thon for two years and is a Varsity Club member. A four-year letterwinner for the Blackhawks softball program, she has started all four years, won a District 3 title and played in a PIAA semifinal.

"As I reflect on the endless hours of hard work, I have put in over my last four years of high school, I have held my

grade point average at a distinguished standard while also performing above and beyond in my sport and earning a scholarship to a Division I university for that sport. Both are not possible without sacrifices not only I made but my parents have made as well, and I think many people don't see that part behind the academic and athletic success."

Michael Singley: Michael has earned distinguished honors every quarter all four years, is a three-year National Honor Society member and has a 97-grade point average. He is awaiting word on whether he has been accepted into the Coast Guard Academy, his dream since the seventh grade, to study mechanical engineering and continue his athletic career. He has also been accepted at Grove City College as his second option. For six straight years he has competed in the Capital Science and Engineering Fair, is in the Varsity Club and was a teaching assistant. A four-sport athlete who earned 13 varsity letters in soccer, swimming, cross country and track and field, Michael has 10 individual District 3 medals, qualified for the PIAA Championships in two sports, earned a state medal in cross country and was an All-State swimmer.

"Since before high school I have been focused on a career in engineering, mainly mechanical engineering. It probably started with Lego sets I received as a child and then developed into a keen interest in cars. In my free time I build and redesign hobby grade remote control cars. I am also restoring a 1957 International truck with my 82-year-old Grandpap. Through him I have learned so much about classic engines. It is because of this I see myself in a field related to engines and design."

Trinity

Jess Knaub: Jess has made first honors all four years and is a member of the National Honor Society and Math Honors Society with a 4.0-grade point average. She plans to attend Siena College in New York and study psychology while continuing her soccer career at the NCAA Division I level. A Mini-Thon committee member, Jess has also served with community organizations including Radiant Hope and Helping Hands while holding a leadership position in the Trinity Mentor Group program. Jess is a two-sport athlete with five varsity levels including four years in soccer and has received several all-star recognitions and finished her career with 126 points.

"During the end of my eighth-grade year I was diagnosed with a rare type of lymphoma called Lymphomatoid Papulosis and two years later I was diagnosed with chronic stage 2 kidney disease. Although I have to manage these diseases for the rest of my life, I would not change it for the world. These sicknesses have helped turn me into not only a strong person, but also into a strong athlete. There have been many days where I have been extremely sick, however I never let it define me, if anything it motivated me. It helped motivate me to never give up and to always work hard no matter how sick and down I may feel."

JR Long: JR has been a first honors student every semester and a two-time National Honor Society member and Math Honors Society member with a 4.6-grade point average. He plans to attend Holy Cross to major in economics and play NCAA Division I lacrosse. A two-time Mini-THON committee chairman, JR also spent time a two-year Mentor Group

leader, was a summer camp volunteer and was an activity representative. A four-year varsity letterwinner in lacrosse, he is recognized as one of the top goalies in the state, served as a two-time team captain and received All-Star recognition.

Writing allows me to validate my feelings and thoughts, while sports or exercising allows me to work the ideas out and clear my head. This helps me stay mentally focused, but also helps me stay healthy."

Aiden Russell: Aiden has been a distinguished honor roll student all four years, a two-year member of the National Honor Society and has a 98-grade point average. He plans to attend Elizabethtown College and pursue a civil engineering degree while continues his baseball career. Aiden owns a black belt in Taekwondo and enjoys being outdoors. Aiden has earned four varsity letters playing baseball for the Mustangs including All-Star honors following his junior year.

"Something that is not always reflected but needs recognized is that I care for and love my family and support system deeply. My mother, father, sister, and girlfriend have all been intensely rooted in the growth and success that I have experienced throughout my high school career, and I wouldn't want them to go unrecognized whatsoever."

In three years, I sustained a sprained wrist, a ruptured bursa, two sprained ankles, a concussion, a bruised rotator cuff, and multiple problematic knee injuries. I spent the same amount of time in PT rooms, hospitals, and doctor's offices, as the court/field. I believe that these experiences as a person and athlete have made me resilient."

Joshua Lehman: Joshua has been an honor student for 13 marking periods and earned distinguished honors one marking period as well. He will attend Bloomsburg University, major in sports management and continues his soccer career at the NCAA Division II level.
