Gwen Wentz Alexander

Gwen's life as an athlete has been one of devotion, skill building, coaching, teaching, multi-tasking and service leadership that began right here on the West Shore. She started her career playing both field hockey and basketball at Mechanicsburg High School. She served as captain for both teams and was named All-League in both sports, graduating in 1969. She later returned to teach and coach at Mechanicsburg High School for one year after college.

In college at West Chester University she played both field hockey and lacrosse and was named All-Region in her senior year in both sports. In field hockey she played every minute of every game in her sophomore, junior and senior years. As captain, she lead the team to an undefeated senior season in what was considered the "hot bed" league of field hockey in the nation.

While still in college, Gwen was recruited as goalkeeper for the U.S. National Field Hockey Team in 1972. This began a twelve-year journey of play and travel throughout the world. The National Team circumnavigated the world several times playing in: Australia, New Zealand, The Netherlands, Great Britain, Germany, South Africa, Japan, Belgium and Hong Kong.

In the 1979 World Cup Games, the U.S. National Team entered the competition in 11th place and finished in 3rd place, qualifying for the next Olympic games to be held in Russia. The U.S boycotted the 1980 Olympics. Although the team did not play in those games, Gwen received the honor of being named "Best in the World" for her goalkeeping skills.

Most of the 1980 Olympic team remained with the National Team to play in the 1984 Olympics held in Los Angeles, CA. After the Australians lost to the Netherlands, the U.S. team competed in a "shoot out" against Australia for the Bronze Medal. In Field Hockey, each team gets 10 shots on goal 7 yards out from the goal line. The Australians went first alternating with the U.S. As the U.S. goalkeeper, Gwen saved so many shots against the Australians that by the 7th round the U.S. had secured the "Olympic Medal".

After the Olympic games the team toured five U.S. cities ending with a ticker tape parade in New York City. In 1984 she was also awarded the prestigious Legion of Honor from the Four Chaplains Memorial Foundation. Gwen has always considered her time on the National Team an honor and tried throughout those years to be a world ambassador for Field Hockey. From 1979-1988, Gwen coached Field Hockey and Lacrosse at Temple University and continued her career on the National Field Hockey Team. She still holds the career coaching record of 115 wins in field hockey at Temple University.

Gwen eventually moved to become the National Team's Goalkeeping Coach. In that coaching position she helped the U.S. team again qualify for the 1992 Olympics in Australia. She developed and authored the National Futures Goalkeeping Teaching Curriculum that remains in use today. She was with the National Team as an athlete for twelve years and as a coach for an additional 3 years.

Gwen also coached for the University of Pennsylvania where the field hockey team won the Ivy League Championship. At the same time she was teaching and coaching at Philadelphia's Penn Charter High School. Her coaching career finished with time at Old Dominion University and Washington and Lee University.

Gwen has been inducted into the Mechanicsburg High School Hall of Fame, the West Chester University Hall of Fame, Temple's Athletic Hall of Fame, and United States Field Hockey Hall of Fame.

She and her husband C.K. are retired living in Lexington, VA. They have two children. Son Dallas teaches in the Philadelphia public schools and officiates field hockey for the NCAA. Daughter, Brandilyn, is married with twin boys and is currently the Head Field Hockey Coach at Queens College at Charlotte.























Betty Lou Bischof-Andrade

Betty Lou Bischof-Andrade is a graduate of Camp Hill High School and Towson State University.

Betty Lou started her basketball career in 8th grade, when the legendary Harry DeFrank and his assistant Steve Bischof Jr., re-started the Girls Basketball program at Good Shepherd. Good Shepherd won the CYO League Tournament, and she was voted MVP.

Betty Lou earned 11 varsity letters at Camp Hill High School participating in basketball, field hockey, track and field and cross country. She was a four-year starter in basketball and helped lead the Lady Lions to a 49-13 record in Blue Mountain League play. The Lady Lions won a District Championship and two league titles. The Lady Lions advanced to the State playoffs in three consecutive seasons. The 1978 team went on to play in the State Quarterfinals.

During her four years she compiled 408 assists, 597 steals, 417 rebounds and 1321 points. Betty Lou achieved the honor to be the first girl at Camp Hill to score 1000 points without the benefit of the three point shot or smaller ball. She is third leading scorer in Camp Hill history and her

younger sister, Terri holds the top spot. She was a 3 time Patriot News "Big 15"

and All-Conference League selection. Betty Lou participated in several all-star games her senior year. She was selected as Best Defensive player in the PA East-West Tournament.

Betty Lou also competed four years in track and field. Her junior and senior year she won first place in the javelin at the conference meet. Her senior year she won the District title in Javelin and placed 6th at State's. She continues to hold the school records for the javelin and as a member of the 4x400 relay team. At one time she also held records for the long jump, discus and as a member of the 4x100 relay records.

Her junior and senior year she played Field Hockey. She was the leading scorer both years and co-captained the teams.

Betty Lou was a four-year starter at point guard for Towson State University.

She finished her career with a school-record 521 assists, a mark that still stands. A two-year co-captain, Bischof helped the Tigers to four consecutive winning seasons, including the 1984 East Coast Conference championship.

In the Tigers' 61-58 come-from-behind win over Delaware in the '84' championship game, she scored four points in the final minute, hitting a jumper to pull the Tigers within 58-57 with 51 seconds left and making a steal and hitting the titleclinching free throws with one second remaining.

As a sophomore she set a Towson single-season record with 143 assists and 6.0 assists per game. She was the Most Valuable Player at the Towson Invitational Tournament as a freshman. She also holds the Towson single-game record with 15 assists as a senior, a mark that was also the ECC record.


1997 she was inducted into the Towson Hall of Fame alongside her husband John "Hector" for his baseball accomplishments.

2009 she was selected as a Towson Legend and honored at the Colonial Athletic Association Award Banquet.

Betty Lou is the daughter of Betty and Steve Bischof and the seventh of eight children. Betty Lou is very thankful and appreciative that her parents raised her and her siblings in an environment where family values were the most important aspect of her life. Fortunately for Betty Lou and the Bischof family, sporting events simply served as family get-togethers.

She is grateful to the West Shore Hall of Fame for honoring her this evening. This honor has allowed her to relive memories of teammate's, opponents, coaches, trainers, bus drivers, wins and losses. This by-product she will cherish!

Betty Lou and her husband Hector reside in Camp Hill and is employed as a Marketing Manager for Disability Care Management Professionals.





Lois Brommer Duquette

Lois Brommer Duquette was born and raised in Mechanicsburg, and attended Mechanicsburg schools from kindergarten through graduation in 1982. Watching her older brother run track and cross country made her eager for her chance to race some day too. Lois joined the junior high track team in 7th grade and began her career running the 400, 800 and 4x400 relay.

In 9th grade, Lois had the good fortune to cross paths with coach George Henry. Mr. Henry turned Lois into a miler and knew how to train her to have both speed and endurance. Having refused to race the mile the year before in junior high, she finished off her frosh year by placing 8th in the mile at the PIAA state meet.


For the rest of her high school career, Lois was one of the leading runners in the state and country. In cross country she won the District III championship for three years and still has the fastest winning time ever, her sophomore year she placed 5th at the PIAA championships and then was runnerup in her junior and senior years. Her senior year she won the Northeast Regional qualifier race for the Kinney (now Footlocker) national championships and placed second at the national championships in a time of 16:45 for a 5K. ranked 6th and 8th in the country for high schoolers for 1981. Her indoor 3200m of 10:26 remains a state best. Her freshman year at Harvard Lois was a scoring member of the cross country team which placed 4th at the 1982 NCAA championships. Harvard also won the Heptagonal Championships all three years she ran. In 1986, Lois finished her collegiate career by winning the 10,000m Heptagonal championship in a time of 34:34 and also ran a time of 16:25 in the 5,000 meters, which remains a top 5 time for Harvard women. She was named a member of Harvard's honorary Silver Anniversary track team, which celebrated the top track athletes in the first 25 years of women's track and field at Harvard.

After college, Lois attended Harvard Law School and while there was a member of the Legal Aid Bureau, providing free legal services to the poor. She was one of the top road racers in New England while attending law school and practicing law in Boston before having children. She returned to Central Pennsylvania to work for The Hershey Company where her responsibilities included protecting Hershey's trademarks. Currently she practices intellectual property law with McNees Wallace & Nurick LLC in Harrisburg.

In track, Lois won 4 District 3 gold medals, winning three in her junior year when she won the 800m, 1600m and 3200m on the same day. Thirtyfive years later, her 3200m time of 10:22 is still the District 3 record. She went on to place second at the PIAA championships in the 1600m with a time of 4:48, breaking the prior state record by five seconds, and then took first in the 3200m in a time of 10:28, which stood as a state record for over ten years. Her 1600m and 3200m times were



Lois has been married to Ralph Duquette for 26 vears and has been blessed with three children. She will always be grateful that Title IX was enacted just as she was reaching the age to participate in school sports and opened up many opportunities that were not available to girls just a few years older than she. She is also grateful that her family supported her running while emphasizing that academics were always more important.




Ginny Honeysett


Ginny Honeysett's officiating career began shortly after graduating from Temple University in 1969 where she majored in Health, Physical Education, and Recreation. She began playing field hockey and lacrosse at Plymouth Whitemarsh High School where her love for sports began. She took her field hockey and lacrosse skills to the next level as she played both sports at Temple University for four years and served as captain of both sports her senior year. Upon graduating from Temple and beginning a teaching career, she also earned her certification as a United States Woman's Field Hockey Official and a United States Woman's Lacrosse Official. She continued to officiate at both the high school and college level going on to earn her national rating for both field hockey and lacrosse through the USFHA and the USWLA. In addition, she became a member of the P.I.A.A. as a field hockey official in 1972. Ginny officiated at the local high school level, the collegiate level, the national level and the international level during her officiating career. She has also been an active member of the Harrisburg Board of Field Hockey Officials for over forty years and served on the executive committee in various capacities for many years.

Ginny's teaching and coaching career began right after graduation at Hatboro-Horsham Senior High School in Montgomery County, PA. She taught health and physical education at the high school in addition to being the head hockey and lacrosse coach at Hatboro until moving to the Mechanicsburg area. After moving to the area, she began coaching at Dickinson College as an assistant lacrosse coach and at Shippensburg University as an assistant field hockey coach under Jane Goss. She also continued her teaching at Cumberland Valley High School and officiated continuously while she and her husband raised three boys. She is retired, after 28 years, from the Cumberland Valley School District but has continued officiating, training officials, and substitute teaching. Ginny has a long list of accomplishments but she will tell you her greatest is her family. She and her husband Gib have been married for 48 years and raised three extraordinary sons. Geoff is a member of the West Shore Hall of Fame, which may make this the first mother/son combination to be inducted. Mike followed in his brother's successful footsteps excelling on the soccer field and in life. Her oldest, Chris, who has Down Syndrome, has worked at Holy Spirit Hospital for 28 years and is an active participant in a variety of sports for Special Olympics. She adores her grandchildren Kayla, Lauren, Michaela and Charlie and her step grandchildren Cassidy and Gage.



















Ron Lewis

Currently the assignor for 45 high schools in the Mid-Penn Conferences and schools in the surrounding areas


Successor to George Wrightstone (deceased, Hall of Fame Class of 1985) also the senior sports assignor in years of service to the Mid Penn conference

Bruce Z. McLanahan II


Bruce Z. McLanahan II is a 1969 graduate of Camp Hill High School and 1973 graduate of The Pennsylvania State University. He majored in political science with a minor in history. Bruce turned in his baseball glove and bat at age 12 to follow in his older brother Greg's footsteps, as a distance runner. In their hometown of Greencastle, Pennsylvania they were considered "unusual" as they both were constantly running in town and the surrounding countryside.

Piling up the miles and awards, older brother Greg would win four District III titles and a PIAA cross country state championship in 1965. In that same year (1965) Bruce would move to Camp Hill. His high school track career would include six trips to the PIAA state championships and six medals. In the District III championship he would win two championships in the mile run in 1968 and 1969 and four runner up silver medals in cross country in the 880 yard run and the two mile relays. His senior year he broke the existing record for PIAA class B mile run by running a 4:20.2 mile. Scholarships from Villanova, Maryland and Penn State arrived and Bruce chose Penn State. Penn State teammates included Greg Fredericks and Charlie Maguire, both NCAA champs or runner ups. He lettered on the 1971 Penn State cross country team with a five mile best of 25:44.

In 1977 he would marry Debra Ann Miller, a Bishop McDevitt graduate from Harrisburg, PA (this year they will be celebrating their 40th wedding anniversary). Together they would have two wonderful children Bruce Zeller III age 30 and Shannon Marie age 28. Both children would be PA All-state athletes at Camp Hill in football and field hockey.

Always interested in the Camp Hill local community, Bruce ran for borough council in 1993 and won and then unexpectedly was appointed the town mayor. Bruce then won a special election in 1995 and a full term in 1997 as Camp Hill mayor. In March 2001 governor Tom Ridge assisted Bruce to accept an appointment as a PA Department of Environmental Protection Ombudsman. A position he enjoyed thoroughly as he assisted PA small businesses with the environmental laws and regulations of the Commonwealth. Prior to working for the Commonwealth Bruce sold commercial real estate, beer and sporting-goods.

I am both humbled and honored to be named to the 2017 PA Sports Hall of Fame and thank the many people who have made this evening possible along with the other outstanding athletes.













Dick Richardson

Dick Richardson is a 1966 graduate of Susquenita High School and a 1970 graduate of Penn State University. Dick graduated with a B.A. in Accounting, which he used to begin his career in business, passing the CPA exam in 1973. After 12 years in public accounting and another 12 years with two local publicly held health care companies as CFO he started his own healthcare company, specializing in nursing home care, which he sold in 2002.

During his senior year at Susquenita, Dick was the captain of the Track and Basketball teams. High school coaches that helped guide Dick in his career were for basketball (Sam Gruber, Hayes Girvin, John Grove) for football (Don Jonas, Berny Shalonis, Nick Piccolo). He was also blessed by the fact that the track coach was his father, LeRoy Richardson. Dick still holds the school record for javelin at Susquenita at 208' 2". The record set May 6, 1966 as reported in a headline by Charley Frey of the Patriot News, was "Richardson throws javelin through (chain-link) fence for new school record". He was 4th in the state track meet as a junior and injured as a senior. Fortunately, his father was also the Guidance counselor and Assistant Principal at Susquenita, so with his help and Dick's various awards and records, was offered a Scholarship to throw at Penn State. Dick's personal best was 225'10" and obtained the Varsity "S" designation as a senior. Essentially a 4 year letterman. His coaches at PSU that molded his future were John Lucas, Jack Doolittle and later Harry Groves.

Because track can be a life time sport Dick has continued to throw for the last 50 years. He worked with the high school throwers at Cedar Cliff for over 10 years as an assistant coach under Len McLaughlin and Ken Roseberry. Both Javelin records at Cedar Cliff are held by kids he worked with over those 10 + years. One of the most rewarding aspects of coaching at Cedar Cliff was the ability to follow in his father's footsteps and coach his three younger children. Dick continues to stop by on sunny days to throw a few and lend some helpful advice to the young throwers.


Dick has traveled all over the world throwing his javelin, usually with all or part of his family. They've been to Australia, New Zealand, Lahti Finland, Riccione Italy, and recently in Port Alegre Brazil and Lyon France. Most recently Dick finished 7th out of 42 in the 65 to 69 age group at the World championships in Lyon France. Finally beating a Russian (Aleksandr Bykov) that he had lost to at least 10 times over 20 years. He was second in the US Senior games in Cleveland Ohio in 2013. He was ranked 15th in the world and 8th in the US at the end of 2015 in the 65 to 69 year old age group. He still holds the 50 to 55 year old PA Keystone games record.

At the age of 66, Dick decided to challenge himself to climb Mt. Kilimanjaro. He reached the summit at 19,341 ft. and started thinking that this achievement may be the capstone of his athletic career. After returning home from "the mountain", Dick was overwhelmed by support and encouragement from his family to continue his lifelong passion of competing and throwing the Javelin. Dick's family has always been a huge part of his success. He is thankful to his parents (both passed), loving sisters, and of course his five children and five grandchildren. If you happen upon Cedar Cliff's track on a summer evening you will see Dick preparing for meets all over the U.S. in 2017 and a trip to Malaga, Spain in 2018.











Scott Shirley

Scott Shirley is a 1999 graduate of East Pennsboro High School where he was a three-sport athlete who finished with 12 varsity letters in football, baseball, basketball, and a member of the school's Hall of Fame. The diversity of Scott the person extends well beyond the athletic field, though.

An accomplished football and baseball player, Scott had to make a choice his senior year which sport to play in college and which school would serve all his desires as a studentathlete best. Twice a leading wide receiver in the mid-state, he finished with more than 2,000 career receiving yards as a wide receiver for the Panthers while also playing defense, special teams, and even quarterback for part of his senior year. Also a four-year varsity baseball player for East Pennsboro, Scott's senior year he hit a staggering .585 with an on-base percentage of .667 and a slugging percentage of .923. So picking a sport and school was not an easy decision for the 1999 John Travers Award winner and Eagle Scout.


Ultimately Scott, the son of the late long-time Mechanicsburg baseball coach and teacher Don Shirley and Joyce Shirley, a retired elementary school teacher from Lower Dauphin, chose to play football for the late Joe Paterno at Penn State University.

An Academic All-Big Ten selection, Scott graduated from Penn State with a B.S. in Civil Engineering & M.Eng. in Construction Engineering after winning the Frank Patrick Award for Total Commitment in 2002. He played on a pair of Nittany Lion teams that finished ranked in the Top 10 (1999 and 2002) and was a part of Joe Paterno's 324th victory that broke Bear Bryant's record. He played on special teams on the Capital One Bowl team (2003) and also was a baseball letterman in 2002. He also guided the Penn State Club Baseball team to the semi-finals of the World Series (2004) while leading the team in homeruns and batting average.

After two years working for Clark Construction in Washington D.C. as an engineer, Scott made a bold career move and started Uplifting Athletes, a national nonprofit that works with college football teams to raise money for rare disease research (2007). In less than a decade of existence, Uplifting Athletes has made an estimated impact on the rare disease community of more than \$400 million. Upon returning to the area, Scott was called out of retirement by Bill Rickenbach to join the Mechanicsburg Cardinals for four more championship seasons.

Currently, Scott – recognized by Penn State University in 2016 with its Alumni Achievement Award - is the Founder and CEO of Pledge It, an early-stage tech company empowering athletes to raise money through their gameday performance. Married to Stephanie since 2012, the couple has two boys Holden (3) and Bennis (1) and lives in Mechanicsburg.
