





## **Donnie Eppley**

Donnie Eppley was born in the Dunham Army Hospital located at Carlisle Barracks in Pennsylvania. He attended Carlisle Area Senior High School and immediately upon graduation entered the United States Army. After serving a tour at Fort Bragg, North Carolina, he was reassigned to Germany, where he began his officiating career. After initially officiating many sports, he settled on basketball and has been doing so since 1985.

While serving in the United States Army in Europe, Donnie officiated in the German League and was selected to represent the United States on two separate occasions in the prestigious Albert Schweitzer Tournament held in Mannheim, Germany, which featured some of the world's most talented basketball players. He also was selected to officiate another international tournament in the French Riviera.

In 2004, he officiated the McDonald's All-American game, which showcases the top high school basketball players in the United States. A huge proponent of the Special Olympics, he volunteered in an officiating capacity at the National Special Olympics held in Ames, Iowa in 2006 and in the World Special Olympics in Dublin, Ireland in 2003.

Other highlights include officiating a PIAA (Pennsylvania Interscholastic Athletic Association) State Final in 2007 and the NCAA Division III Men's Basketball National Semi-Final in Salem, Virginia in 2009. Throughout his career, Donnie has officiated more than 1,000 Division I men's basketball games in 12 conferences. He was selected to officiate in 12 NCAA Men's Basketball Division I tournaments, advancing to the second round four times. He also officiated the finals of the CBI (Collegiate Basketball Invitational) Post-Season tournament in 2012 and 2013.

For over twenty years, Donnie has served as the basketball assignor for 42 high schools in central Pennsylvania. Together with Mike Chesney and Bob Pugh, he coordinates the only Small College Officiating Alliance (Eastern Basketball Officiating Alliance -- EBOA), comprised of 98 Division II and III colleges and universities in the Mid-Atlantic Region.

This past season (2022-23), Donnie joined the Big Ten staff and assists with the day-to-day operations and is a key observer of officials, helping to provide feedback to improve the quality of officiating. He also helped spread the word on a

new program to train, educate and develop basketball officials in under-served communities, partnering with YMCAs and Boys and Girls Clubs in multiple locations throughout the U.S. to bring new officials into the fold.

Donnie proudly served 20 years in the United States Army, retiring from the United States Army War College located at Carlisle Barracks. He is currently employed with the International Association of Approved Basketball, Inc. (IAABO) as the Director of Membership and Technology. In 2022, Donnie was awarded IAABO Life Membership – IAABO's most prestigious award. Donnie is happily married to Terrie. Together, they have one daughter, and he has a stepson.


During the isolation period of Covid, Donnie led the IAABO organization into new territory, adding weekly Zoom sessions to connect with and train officials, while also providing a variety of programs to expand IAABO's reach.

Donnie is widely known throughout the officiating community as a responsible, high quality individual who follows through quickly, specifically and thoroughly on critical issues. Also known for his robust sense of humor and support of other officials, his love for the game of basketball is demonstrated repeatedly in searching for new officials, offering personal support and developing the next generation of talent to keep the great game of basketball growing.

































## Leah Gingrich

Leah Gingrich is a professional swimmer hailing from Enola, Pennsylvania, who started swimming at the age of four. She attended and swam for East Pennsboro High School, where she graduated before swimming and competing for the West Shore YMCA under the tutelage of Head Coach Mike Gobrecht.

Leah's prowess in the pool was evident from a young age, as she qualified for the Olympic Trials at the age of 14 in 2004, by just .01 in the 800 freestyle. She went on to become a member of the Junior National Team in 2006 and the World Youth Team in 2006 in Brazil. She also earned a spot on the World Championship Team in 2007, cementing her status as one of the best swimmers in the world.

Leah's impressive accolades also include being a sixtime individual Pennsylvania State Champion and a two-time Olympic Trials Finalist in 2008, in the 200 fly and 800 free. She was also a two-time Pennsylvania State Swimming MVP.

Leah's exceptional performance in the pool is further highlighted by her holding two Long Course YMCA National Meet records from 2008, for the 200 IM and 200 butterfly, which currently stand as the longest-standing records among both male and female swimmers.


She has qualified for the Olympic Trials five times, with the upcoming 2024 trials marking her fifth qualification (she was not competing in 2016).

After graduating in 2012, Leah took a six-year hiatus from swimming before making a triumphant return in 2018. Within a few months, she had qualified for nationals and swum a best time in the 100 fly. Leah continued to excel in the pool, becoming a member of the ISL in 2020 and competing for DC Trident. In 2021, she switched teams and competed for the Tokyo Frog Kings.

Leah's commitment to the sport of swimming extends beyond her own pursuits. From 2016 to recently, she coached the developmental program for the Columbus Aquatic Club, playing an instrumental role in nearly tripling the size of the program.

Leah is currently training for the Paris 2024 Olympics, and with her impressive track record, it's clear that she will continue to make waves in the world of swimming.

















## Katelyn (Murray) Hanner

Katelyn (Murray) Hanner, born and raised in central Pennsylvania, was a 2005 graduate of Trinity High School and a 2009 graduate of St. Bonaventure University. Starting at an early age, sports have always played a major role in her life. The discipline, hard work, and team effort needed to succeed have molded her into a leader both on and off the basketball court, and in turn, allowed her to pursue her passion for teamwork and community by continuing her education and becoming a local dentist. The countless hours on the court and behind the scenes working hard have paid off to earn this humbling recognition from the West Shore Chapter of the Pennsylvania Hall of Fame.

Katelyn played many sports growing up; however, basketball always seemed to be the sport to stick. Both of Katelyn's parents played in college at Franklin and Marshall, and both were important role models to her overall success. Once high school started, Katelyn continued to focus on her basketball career. As a freshman at Trinity, she had joined a varsity squad that had just won the state championship the year prior. Under the guidance of legacy Coach, Harry DeFrank, Katelyn was able to establish her name in the record books at Trinity. As a 4 year varsity letter winner, she finished with 1,250 career points. Throughout her 4 years, Trinity was a two-time District 3 Champion and made multiple state playoff appearances, including runner up in the state finals. Katelyn was a two-time Big 15 team selection and a McDonald's All-American Nominee. Katelyn was named first team all-state, named the Sentinel Player of the year, and 'AA' District III First Team MVP. Katelyn also earned herself several academic awards throughout her career at Trinity, as well. All accolades, both academic and athletic, allowed Katelyn to continue her career at the next level.

After graduation from Trinity, Katelyn earned a full scholarship to play basketball at Division I St. Bonaventure University. While earning a biology degree, Katelyn also earned her position as a 4 year letter winner and starter for the team. Head Coach Jim Crowley played a valuable role to allow Katelyn to not only succeed on the court, but also to succeed in the classroom. Throughout her career as a Bonnie, Katelyn finished with over 1,000 points, named to the Atlantic 10 Academic All-Conference team, was recognized as the Atlantic 10 Female Scholar-Athlete of the Year and named an ESPN Magazine Academic All American finalist. By Katelyn's senior year, the Bonnies had made post season play for the first time in school history, making it through to the WNIT Quarterfinals. Katelyn also excelled in the classroom,

where she graduated with a 4.0 GPA and Summa Cum Laude Honors. The ability to succeed in academics allowed Katelyn the opportunity to continue to grow professionally and start her next step of education at Temple Dental School in 2010.

Katelyn Hanner, now Dr. Hanner, completed 4 years of dental school and was fortunate to be able to return to central Pennsylvania in 2014 to continue her career. Katelyn has since become partners within the local Verber Dental Group and is the active managing partner at the Camp Hill location, Verber Family Dentistry. Named one of the top 40 dentists under the age of 40, Katelyn continues to make an impact in the community in which she grew up in.

Katelyn currently resides in Harrisburg, PA with her husband, Nathan Hanner, and their 3 children – Weston, age 4, Nora, age 2, and Piper, 2months old. She is so very thankful for everyone who has made such an impact in her life leading up to this recognition, including her parents, John and Kelly Murray, her siblings, and the numerous coaches that have all made such an impact on her career. Sports have been and will always be a huge part of her life and will always be the reason for why and where she is today.





















## Heather (Conroy) Hower

Heather (Conroy) Hower is a 1999 graduate of Susquenita High School and a 2003 graduate of Penn State University. She received her MBA from Temple University in 2014. Her athletic adventures, playing or coaching, have been blessed with many outstanding coaches, teammates, and colleagues. She is extremely honored and humbled to be inducted into the West Shore Chapter of Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame, Inc.

While a student-athlete at Susquenita, Heather participated in many sports. She graduated with 12 varsity letters in 4 different sports- Field Hockey, Basketball, Track and Field, and Softball. She scored almost 1,300 points in basketball, but Field Hockey was her love. She played under Barb "T" Adams, who pushed her to be her best. Heather helped her team win multiple Perry County Tournaments, Mid-Penn Championships, and even made it to states her junior year- a first in program history. She was a Patriot News Big 11 selection and 1st team All-State selection.

Heather received numerous awards for her excellence in academics and athletics, she graduated 6th in her high school class and was voted Prom Queen, President of her Class, Student Council President, and National Honor Society President. She was also named the Patriot News 1999 Female John Travers Award winner.

After graduation from high school, Heather attended Penn State University to further her education on a Field Hockey scholarship. At Penn State more academic and athletic awards were earned for her: multiple Big 10 Tournament and Conference champions, and a National runner- up in 2002. 3 x Academic All-American, 2 x Captain, 2 x 1st Team Regional All-American, 2 x Big 10 unanimous 1st team selection, and 2 x 1st Team All-American.

In addition to her field hockey accolades, Heather was voted and named Student of the Year for her Temple University MBA class in 2014 by her peers.

At the conclusion of her collegiate field hockey career,

Heather went into medical sales. Starting out in pharmaceutical sales and moving into medical device sales in operating rooms in 2009. She's also been very active in coaching both youth and high school field hockey, and for the USFHA organization.

Heather currently resides back in her hometown of Duncannon, PA with her two daughters, Peyton 11, and Vivian 8. Where she runs the Susquenita Youth Field Hockey program, helping with the Varsity program, and coaches both her daughters U12 and U10 club/travel teams for the Revolution field hockey organization.

Heather has been extremely blessed with many wonderful friends and family throughout her life. Her parents, Mike and Karen Conroy, were a significant part of making her the strong woman she is today. They made sure she had every opportunity available that she ever wanted and took any plane, train, and automobile to watch her play sports. 


























## Jamie Miller

Being inducted into the West Shore Chapter of the Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame is an amazing opportunity and one that Jamie Miller is extremely humbled to be selected. Jamie graduated from Red Land High School (1998), James Madison University (2002) with a B.S. in Kinesiology, and Shippensburg University (2006) with a Master of Educational Leadership.

Jamie played volleyball for coach Jeff Floyd who was very understanding of her busy soccer schedule and willing to work with her so she could do both sports. While playing volleyball for Red Land, she was a key team member winning the league championship in 1996.

Her fierce style of play earned her Mid Penn All-Star honors in both her Junior and Senior years while leading the team in blocks and digs.

Whether smashing a good kill, draining a foul shot, or scoring a header goal, Jamie loved competing for Red Land. While she enjoyed playing volleyball, basketball and soccer were her main focuses.

From the hardwood courts of volleyball to the hardwood floors of basketball, Jamie transitioned to basketball season. Jamie loved every second of the basketball season under coach Mike Mausner who was intense and demanding. Jamie was a four-year Varsity letter winner helping her team win the league championship two out of the four years they made it to the finals. All 4 years, she was selected to the Mid Penn All-Star teams and selected to play in the Pennsylvania versus Maryland All-Star game her senior year. She finished her career with 1,088 points and a lifetime of positive memories from her basketball seasons.

Beginning soccer at age 3, Jamie found her real passion on the soccer pitch. Making Districts and State play-offs under head coach Mark Culver, her hard work was noticed. In her Junior and Senior years, she was named Mid-Penn Player of the Year, All-State, and All-Region. She wrapped up her high school career by being named a High School All-American.

Jamie was recruited to James Madison University, where she was a 4-year letter winner for the Dukes. She played under the legendary Head Coach, Dave Lombardo. While at JMU,


Jamie was named CAA Defensive Player of the Year, Virginia All-State, and Regional All-American. At the end of her college career, Jamie was invited to the WUSA combine, where she had her first professional tryout.


After college, Jamie moved back home and has been a Health and Physical Education teacher in West Shore School District for the last 21 years. She is currently in her 21st season coaching the Red Land girls' soccer team and also spent some time coaching within the Red Land boys' program. Coaching is a way for her to give back to the school she loves. She has earned numerous coaching awards over the years. Most recently, Jamie was named the A. I. Garner Coach of the Year in 2021.

## **Colonel Thomas Spahr**

Colonel Tom Spahr was born in 1975 and attended Catholic School at Good Shepherd and Trinity High School before earning his undergraduate at the University of Delaware and his Masters and Ph.D. at The Ohio State University. Tom started playing soccer at the age of five. He discovered in high school that he had a gift for running as he consistently finished first in the conditioning runs on Trinity soccer team. Tom competed in soccer and cross country during the same season during his junior and senior year, broke the crosscountry school and course record, and became Trinity's first state medal winner. He was named to the conference All Star team for soccer and the Carlisle Sentinel honored him as athlete of the week when he earned a state cross country medal and won a district soccer semi-final game on the same day. Tom was also captain and MVP of his track team as a senior.

Tom earned a four-year Army ROTC scholarship and started at the University of Delaware in 1993, deciding not to run or play soccer because of his military commitment. He competed in the Army ROTC Ranger Challenge competition all four years at Delaware and was the captain of the Army ROTC Army 10-miler team. After his first semester Tom walked on to the track team at Delaware. He ran the 3000-meter, 5000-meter, and the 3000-meter steeple chase and earned six conference medals over his four years. Tom was an Athletic All-American and the top Army ROTC Cadet in the Army 10-miler three times.

Tom was commissioned as a Military Intelligence Officer in 1997 and during his first assignment in the 82nd Airborne Division at Fort Bragg he ran twice for the Fort Bragg Army Ten Miler team. He also became an avid triathlete and won honors as the fastest 19–24-year-old triathlete in the State of North Carolina in 1998. In 1999 Tom was selected to serve in the 75th Ranger Regiment at Fort Benning and became captain of the Ranger Regiment Army 10-miler team, running a personal best 54:42 in the Army Ten in 2000. In 2001 Tom was again the captain of the Ranger Regiment Army 10-miler team but the race was canceled because of the September 11 attacks on the Pentagon.

Tom's focus changed on September 11, and in October 2001 he deployed for the invasion of Afghanistan with the Ranger Regiment, his first of four deployments to that country (2001, 2004, 2012, 2019). He also deployed twice to Colombia (2003) and took part in three multinational training exercises in Eastern Europe (2016-2017). Tom's military assignments included service in the 82nd Airborne Division (2x), the 75th Ranger Regiment, the 7th Special Forces Group, the National

Geospatial Intelligence Agency, the 4th Infantry Division, and the Resolute Support Headquarters, Afghanistan. He earned his Master's Degree in 2007 and his Ph.D. in History from Ohio State in 2011, taught Military History at West Point from 2007-2010 and the US Air Force Academy from 2015-2016 and was the Speechwriter for the Vice Chief of Staff of the Army from 2013-2015. He is currently the Chairman of the Department of Military Strategy, Planning, and Operations at the Army War College, Carlisle Barracks, and glad to be back home in Pennsylvania. Tom hasn't stopped competing. When he was a student at the Army War College in 2019, he won the Jim Thorpe Sports Day 5K and was 2nd in the cycling event. Jim Thorpe Sports Day is the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps and National War College annual competition among senior service college students.

Tom married Megan in 2002 and they have been blessed with three incredible daughters who are currently students at Saint Patrick's and Trinity. Tom has had the pleasure of coaching all three of his girls' soccer teams until they were about 10-years-old when he handed them over to professionals. He now coaches the distance runners for the Saint Patrick's Track Team, leads the Carlisle Barracks cycling team, and runs the Jim Thorpe Cycling events every year on Carlisle Barracks. He is a member of Saint Patrick's Catholic Parrish, on the St Patrick's school board, and active in the Catholic Chapel on Carlisle Barracks.

























## **Todd Stuter**

Todd Stuter is a 1985 graduate of Kishacoquillas High School in Reedsville PA. He attended Lock Haven University and was a 4 year letterman in football. He graduated in 1990 with a BS in Special Education. Todd took his first teaching job at Millersburg High School in the fall of 1990 and this was his first high school football coaching experience. In the Fall of 1991, Todd accepted a teaching and coaching position at East Pennsboro High School where he served as assistant coach/defensive coordinator until 1997.

Todd Stuter was appointed the East Pennsboro Area Interim Head Football coach in 1997 and Permanent Head Coach in 1999. Over the 22 years he was the Head Coach his record was 134-96. His team qualified for the PIAA District 3 playoffs 7 times and played 10 playoff games. The team was Mid Penn Colonial Division Champions 4 times (2001, 2002, 2014, 2015). He was named Colonial Division Coach of the year in 2002 and 2015. Todd Stuter coached for a total of 29 years.

During his years coaching, he had many athletes go to college to play football at all levels and one made it to the NFL. The most important thing for Todd was that he had many athletes enter the military or go to college to further their educations. His former players are now: Police Officers, Doctors, Civil Engineers, Computer Engineers, Accountants, Officers In the Military, Administrators, Teachers and many other careers. They all learned many valuable life lessons from Todd Stuter in and out of the classroom and on and off the football field.

Todd is thankful for the influence from his parents Ronald and Lona Stuter, and being mentored in coaching by John Weaver and Craig Robbins. He was blessed to have outstanding assistant coaches Mark Morris, Joe Shermeyer, Ted Matter, Steve Etter, Tom Couch, Mickey Shuler and Dave Borrell. He was proud to be able to coach his three sons Garrett, Shay and

Dillon.

Todd currently resides in Enola with his wife Amy, who recently celebrated 30 years of marriage. He is finishing his 32nd year of teaching at East Pennsboro School District. He enjoys spending time with his wife and family.

Jillian Strine: Jillian is a National Honor Society scholar and participated in Mini-thon with a 94.2 grade point average. She plans to attend the University of Buffalo to study business and be part of the swim program. Jillian finished her career with eight varsity letters in volleyball and swimming, was a four-time team captain, earned 11 State Medals (11 All-State Honors), five District 3 gold medals and owns six school records including four at Boiling Springs and two at Shippensburg.

"2020 was a trying year for all of us. It was also the year that I transferred to Boiling Springs High School from Shippensburg High School. I left behind friends and familiar faces. New beginnings are hard enough, but the difficulties were amplified by the pandemic. It did not make it easy to find friends at my new school. Thank goodness I had athletics to help me find a group that had similar interests. I was fortunate to be on a volleyball team who had senior girls who knew how to lead and welcomed me into the school and team. In swimming, I wasn't so lucky. The team was full of underclassman and searching for a leader. So, I stepped up. I used the example set by the senior volleyball captains as a model for my leadership on the swim team. I wanted to make other girls feel included, accepted, and be a friend that they could count on. This was my first trial as a leader."

**Tommy Crum:** Tommy is an honor roll student who also participates in marching band while being a three-sport athlete with an 89.3 grade point average. He plans to attend Shippensburg University and major in sports communication and continue his cross country and track careers. Tommy has 10 varsity letters in cross country, wrestling and track, he was a cross country All-Star and placed 30th and 12th in the PIAA Championships the last two years and owns two school track records.

"My junior year track season is still one of the best memories of track. At the Mid Penn Conference meet, I broke two school records, then got up and ran a 52.4, 400-meter split in the 4x400 relay. Coach Brenner, my track coach, was instrumental in helping me achieve this accomplishment."

#### **Camp Hill**

**Abigail Ebel:** Abigail is a National Honor Society, World Language Honor Society and Tri-M Music Honors Society member with a 96.4 grade point average. She plans to attend Lycoming College to study music and work toward becoming a music professor. A member of the Lions' varsity tennis all four years, Abigail earned gold and silver medals in singles at the Mid-Penn Conference Championships. She also participated in marching band and served as the piano accompanist for choir performances.

"I have been playing piano for 11 years and it has been a main passion in my life. I have done several things in pursuing this passion, including playing in churches, performing in recitals, and making a plan to learn organ in college. I have auditioned at Lycoming and got a \$3,000 renewable music scholarship and have met with the piano professor several times since then to become a part of the music community. With music being a constant in my life, much like tennis is, it was easy for me to declare my major as music education, excited to help people grow a love for music like I did."

**Gavin Nunn:** Gavin is a National Honor Society and World Language Honors Society member with a 96.6 grade point average. He plans to attend Penn State Harrisburg and major in engineering. Gavin earned varsity letters in wrestling and cross country, finishing eighth in wrestling sectionals as a junior. He is also an Eagle Scout.

"My father was an active-duty Marine before he retired, and I've lived in Germany and Japan. Additionally, I think it's important to note that I continued to wrestle for my school during the COVID-19 pandemic and even wrestled with a mask on. I think this act shows my love of the sport and determination to compete no matter the obstacle or challenge in my way."

#### Cedar Cliff

**Sydney Weyant:** Sydney is a member of National Honor Society and has been a distinguished honor roll student every year since elementary school with a 97.6 grade point average. She plans to attend Susquehanna University to study elementary education and continue her basketball career. Sydney has seven varsity letters in tennis and basketball, was a two-time conference all-star in basketball and became the career three-point leader at Cedar Cliff, breaking mark that had stood since 2008.

"When I was 3 years old, I was diagnosed with Type 1 Diabetes. My body just stopped making insulin. I was healthy and an energetic 3-year-old up until then, and now I was faced with a life threatening and incurable disease that I would have to live with the rest of my life. I don't remember much at that time, other than being rushed to the hospital by my parents and finding out that I would have to inject myself with needles, multiple times a day with this liquid called insulin. I have to constantly check my blood glucose levels with another needle that pricked my fingertips, for what seemed like a million times a day. If I didn't do these things, I wouldn't live. So, for the last 14 years, I have been living and fighting this disease. Some days are better than others. I have given myself approximately five shots of insulin a day, for the last 14 years, that is over 25,000 needles that have been pushed into my abdomen. I don't think I am doing anything special; I am just doing what I know I have to do."

**Daniel Schraeder:** Daniel is a four-year distinguished honor roll student with a 94.8 grade point average. He plans to attend Kutztown University to major in sports marketing and minor in coaching and possibly pursue his MBA while continuing his football career. Daniel has six varsity letters in football and lacrosse and his senior football season he was recognized as a two-way first team All-Star and a PA Preps Top 10 defensive lineman in the state.

"Playing lacrosse in college was always going to be my destiny, I thought. It is the sport that helped me through some very difficult times. Unfortunately, it is a fairly new sport at Cedar Cliff with very low numbers and very few wins. After signing to play football at Kutztown, many people recommended I quit lacrosse. Their reasoning was the team's lack of success and my risk of injury "weren't worth it." After debating this for many months leading up to the season, I was unable to allow myself to quit. I felt I owed it to my teammates who have voted me captain for the past three years. They always trusted me and counted on me. I am extremely grateful for the leadership opportunities they have given me."

#### **Cumberland Valley**

**Meredith Seeber:** Meredith is the National Honor Society President and a three-year member of the National World Language Honor Society with a 97.8 grade point average. She plans to attend Boston College to study economics and play club lacrosse at the next level. Meredith has five varsity letters, three in lacrosse and two in basketball, was class treasurer all four year and participated in Key Club all four years.

"With my fourth and final year as a class officer coming to a close, my fellow class officers and I have been striving to create a lasting influence on our school's culture and traditions. Last year, this was shown by us single-handedly reviving Cumberland Valley's junior badminton tournament (previously canceled due to the pandemic), which raised money for the Kick in for Kids charity. Kick in for Kids is a charity that was created thirteen years ago to provide financial aid to students and families in the Cumberland Valley, Mechanicsburg, and East Pennsboro school districts. This past November, my fellow class officers and I planned and held an extremely successful Powderpuff football game to expand education and advocacy for mental health."

**Nolan Gilbert:** Nolan is a National Honor Society member who has been on the honor roll every marking period with a 98.1 grade point average. He plans to attend Alfred University and major in renewable energy engineering and continue his basketball career. Nolan earned four varsity letters in basketball, finished with 883 career points, was a Top Five player in the Mid-Penn Conference as a senior and was recognized as a first-team All-Star.

"A memorable experience in my athletic career is helping our team get to the District 3 Championship at the Giant Center for the first time in 28 years. We came up one point short at the end in overtime, but I had a great game. I scored 24 points and shot very well from the field. Although it was disappointing and we came up short by one point, it was one the best experiences I have ever had in sports so far."

I was heartbroken. Everything I had sacrificed over the many years of playing soccer, in my mind my soccer career was over. But it wasn't! It was the biggest challenge of my life, but my injury didn't break me. In fact, I would say it helped me achieve my soccer goal, taught me valuable life lessons and helped me determine what I want to do with the rest of my life."

**Andrew Swenson:** Andrew is a National Honor Society member, served in leadership for Mini-thon and is Editor & Chief of the Yearbook with a 97 grade point average. He plans to attend Bucknell University to continue academic and athletic careers and wants to attend medical school and become an orthopedic surgeon. Andrew has five varsity letters in baseball and golf, was a baseball All-Star his junior year and considered one of the Top 25 baseball prospects in the state.

"My junior year a new coach changed my life forever. This man, whom I had no prior relationship with, chooses to throw himself 100 percent into my wild journey of recruitment. With no reason to help, no financial gain, Coach Kraemer continues to put his reputation on the line for me and makes time every day to fight for my dream. He is in it for the right reasons. He is honest, passionate, and genuinely interested in the success of his players. He taught me that the actions of one man can make a difference and has inspired me to search for ways to help others, rather than being indifferent."

#### **Harrisburg Academy**

**Camryn Halcovage:** Camryn is a National Honor Society and French National Honor Society member for three years with a 3.9 grade point average. She plans to attend either Penn State or Muhlenberg to study biochemistry and wants to be an exotic veterinarian. Camryn has seven varsity letters in basketball and soccer and her passion for animals was enhanced by a veterinarian internship and volunteering for the Central PA Horse Rescue.

"As a young child I did not participate in sports though I always considered myself very athletic. I did not initially participate in organized team sports, but I always enjoyed sporting activities in gym class and participated in equestrian events as a young child. However, things changed when I entered middle school. I had a teacher who pleaded with me to play basketball. However, this was out of my comfort zone and I preferred soccer, so I was very

hesitant. This teacher persisted and eventually I played basketball a year later. Knowing nothing about the sport, I went to the first practice and immediately enjoyed it. After playing middle school basketball and soccer, I made it to the varsity level as a freshman for both sports. At this point my career in each sport began to flourish. I reached a new level of dedication, hard work, and a growing love for team sports."




